### Advancing Diverse Participation in Research with Special Consideration for Vulnerable Populations

It is imperative for participation in genetics and genomics research to reflect humanity's diversity so that all people can enjoy its benefits. This will take a concerted effort by the research community and must include greater engagement with individuals and communities underrepresented in research. In engaging with vulnerable populations, it is essential that researchers guard against harm resulting from their participation.

In the most recent issue of the *American Journal of Human Genetics (AJHG)*, ASHG published a new <u>Perspective</u> on the need for diversity in research cohorts and considerations for preventing harm in vulnerable populations. The Perspective is part of the latest efforts in ASHG's strategic plan to value, drive, and embody diversity and inclusion in genetics and genomics. In addition, ASHG has signed onto a <u>multi-society letter</u> endorsing Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson's (D-TX) call for research and action on systemic racism in academia.

#### In Other News

- Last week, the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation <u>approved</u> the Research Investment to Spark the Economy (RISE) Act. ASHG supported the bill which would provide the NIH with \$10 billion in relief funding.
- As an organizational affiliate of the American Association for the Advancement of Science
  (AAAS), ASHG encourages trainees, policy advocates, and others in the community to
  submit an abstract for <u>e-poster sessions</u> at the 2021 Virtual AAAS Annual Meeting, February
  8-11.
- The new NIH Fetal Tissue Ethics Advisory Board's recommendations <u>rejected</u> all but one grant application at their meeting.
- Late last month, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) ruled that the
  U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) <u>cannot regulate lab-developed tests</u> without a
  process known as notice and comment rulemaking.

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
