Federal laws and policies have a major influence translation to advances in the clinic and the broader society. It is therefore imperative for Message from the President: ASHG continues ASHG to have a strong voice in how such laws and policies are developed and implemented. In the latest issue of the Messenger, the Society outlines a few policy priorities that will guide future policy and advocacy work. This includes continuing to advocate for funding for genetics and

genomics research, diversity in research cohorts and the workforce, and protecting research participant privacy, among others.

As the world's largest genetics society, ASHG members are the true drivers of change on policies that affect the community both collectively and individually. Thank you to all ASHG Advocates for your advocacy and engagement this past year!

Congress Continues Negotiations on Omnibus Spending Bill and COVID-19 relief

Congressional leadership is negotiating legislation to finalize funding for the federal government for Fiscal Year 2021, including the National Institutes of Health, and provide relief for COVID-19. Currently, the federal government is being funded through a Continuing Resolution (CR), a temporary measure that allows the government to continue to operate while negotiations continue. This CR expires today, December 18, and reports indicate that Congress will pass another CR to allow Congress to continue to work through the weekend.

Advocacy in 2021: New Administration & **New Congress**

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Heading into the new year with a new Administration and the 117th Congress, ASHG will continue to advocate for biomedical research in partnership with the broader community. The Society has joined over 300 organizations in a <u>letter</u> led by the Ad Hoc Group for Medical Research to President-elect Biden. The letter recognizes his strong support for science and urges the Administration to consider key

foundational principles moving forward.

ASHG will also continue to urge Congress to include COVID-19 related relief for researchers in emergency spending packages, as negotiations continue. ASHG has signed onto multi-society letters led by <u>Research!America</u>, and <u>AAAS and the American Society for Microbiology</u> (ASM), in these efforts.
