ASHG Publishes New Guidance Addressing Challenges of Polygenic Scores in Research



On December 1, ASHG published a <u>Guidance</u> in AJHG on addressing the challenges of polygenic scores (PGS) in human genetic research. PGSs have shown promise for studying the biology of complex traits and as a tool for evaluating individual disease risks in clinical settings. Although the quantity and quality of data to compute PGSs are increasing, challenges remain in the technical aspects of developing PGSs and in the ethical and social issues that might arise from their use. This ASHG <u>Guidance</u> makes recommendations to help address some of these challenges.

ASHG Follows Up on Community Engagement Guidance at 2022 Annual Meeting



At the ASHG 2022 Annual Meeting, members of the ASHG Professional Practice and Social Implications Committee (PPSI) and others with subject matter expertise followed up on the "preparatory to research" recommendations from the published *Guidance* on addressing underrepresentation in genetics and genomics research through community engagement. Albert Hinman, PhD, 2022-2023 ASHG Genetics & Public Policy Fellow, wrote a

In Other Policy & Advocacy News

- Larry Tabak, DDS, PhD, acting NIH director, <u>shared</u> gratitude for the NIH community "and everyone who believes in the mission of the NIH." Dr. Tabak discussed widespread support for biomedical research across society as well as NIH's continued diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts related to the biomedical research workforce.
- Watch a <u>recording</u> of Research!America's Post-Election Briefing on the mid-term election outcomes and implications for the 118th Congress. Science and research <u>champions</u> discussed the impact of the newly elected Congress on R&D, and science and medical research.
- ASHG signed on to the Ad Hoc Group for Medical Research's community <u>letter</u> to Appropriations leaders urging swift passage of a FY 2023 spending package and at least \$47.5 billion for NIH's base budget.
- The current continuing resolution (CR) funding the federal government at FY 2022 spending levels will expire on Dec. 16. Congressional leaders are currently <u>working to negotiate</u> topline funding for FY 2023 to avoid a possible year-long CR.
- <u>ELSI Conversations</u> is a series of networking events on ethical, legal, and social implications (ELSI) research. Join the conversation on Dec. 13 for a session entitled, "The All of Us Research Program: What Duties do Researchers Have When Conducting Precision Medicine Research?"
- The ELSI Research Program of the National Human Genome Research Institute (NHGRI) published a <u>perspective</u> entitled, "Three decades of ethical, legal, and social implications research: Looking back to chart a path forward."
- Director of the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP), Dr. Arati
 Prabhakar, <u>spoke</u> with the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) on how we can move science and technology forward.
- The Pew Research Center <u>published</u> the results of a survey that showed a widening partisan divide over scientists' place in policy debates and a perceived decrease in the United States' global standing in scientific achievements.
