The recent abrupt change in NIH's Facilities and Administration (F&A) cost policy will have a significant impact on the scientific community. ASHG Responds to Federal Health Agency Layoffs



Starting on February 13, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) laid off thousands of probationary workers from the NIH, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), among other agencies. It is estimated that at least 3,600 federal workers lost their jobs. ASHG is deeply troubled by these layoffs and believes that the impact of these sudden layoffs on scientific progress and innovation in the United States is "profound and alarming." ASHG Hosts an Educational Webinar for Congressional Staffers

As the 119th Congress begins, ASHG remains committed to keeping human genetics and genomics a key priority for policymakers. We welcomed new and returning members of



Congress on their swear-in day, January 3, 2025, strengthening relationships and sharing with them the impact that human genetics and genomics research has in their state. On February 26, we hosted a webinar for health staffers to provide a foundational understanding of genetics and its role in public policy. Speakers discussed genetic fundamentals, emerging technologies, and the policy and economic implications, highlighting the importance of evidence-based policymaking in this rapidly evolving field.

In Other Policy News

- Research!America recently sent a <u>community letter</u> urging Congress to robustly fund the NIH and prevent an abrupt change to reimbursement of Facilities and Administrative costs. ASHG joined a remarkable 524 organizations and over 3,000 private citizens who endorsed the letter.
- The appropriations process for Fiscal Year (FY) 2025 is still ongoing. Chairman Tom Cole (R-OK) released a <u>statement</u> saying that "Funding the federal government is a constitutional obligation and bipartisan priority. We continue to work to move topline discussions and cooperation forward." The current FY2025 continuing resolution (CR) will expire on <u>March 14, 2025</u>.
- The House Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies
 Appropriations Subcommittee, with jurisdiction over NIH funding, <u>announced</u> a Public
 Witness Hearing on April 9 to discuss fiscal year (FY) 2026 appropriations. Requests to
 testify and/or provide written testimony for the record are due by March 21 and April 9,
 respectively.
- Earlier this month, leaders at the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) Annual Meeting met to discuss the meeting theme, "Science Shaping Tomorrow," and discussed ways in which the scientific enterprise can "bolster itself amid the uncertainty." - Robert F. Kennedy Jr. was <u>sworn in</u> earlier this month as the 26th Secretary of the
 HHS after a <u>52-48 confirmation</u> in the Senate. Stanford professor Jay Bhattacharya,
 MD, PhD, who has been tapped to become the next director of NIH, has yet to be
 scheduled for his confirmation hearing with the Senate Committee on Health,
 Education, Labor, and Pensions (HELP).
